#### Fear Builds A Bridge Across Gulf Of Cultures

VEN on a baking hot day in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, Esther Kiein ambled down the block in a long-sleeved dress and a kerchief concealing her hair in the modest Hasidic fashion. Wheeling her baby's stroller, she stayed three or so paces behind her husband, a slender sh

Few neighborhoods are better illustrations of Mr. Dinkins's "gorgeous mosaic" than Williamsburg.

The Hasidim have recreated something of a shtetl on the blocks around Lee Avenue. The signs are mostly in Yiddish, the smells are of habkas and

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Neighborhoods are fragile things, as delicately balanced as line time pieces. There is a sad, painful history in this city of what well-intentioned master plans can do to them. There are many urban watchers who believe construction of the Cross-Bromx Expressway and Co-op City robbed the streets along the Grand Concourse of a flourishing middle class, leaving behind neighborhoods that are now more tattered and blighted by crime and drugs.

### Navy Yard: New Concerns

Over the years, a patchwork of tonic contamination has riddled the Brooklyn Navy Yard. Decades of shipbuilding and painting with lead-based products fouled the area, and they were followed by years of waste backup from the nearby Newtown Creek Sewage Treatment Plant. Last week, for the first time, a

comprehensive picture of the hazardous wastes emerged, in a study commissioned by the New York Public Interest Research Group. Using Government databases to map taxic wastes, the researchers found, among other things, 192,000 pounds of PCB-contaminated waste that has been spilled or stored, hazardous waste generators and a chemical

"The scope of the pollution issues we found were staggering," said Walter L. T. Hang, president of Tox-ics Targeting Inc., the Ithaca-based group that conducted the study.

This is one of the oldest and most complicated industrial complexes in New York City," added Mr. Hang. whose company has studied 80,000 sites in downstate New York. "Typically where you see such quantities iste, you see a lot of toxic waste

incinerator at the Navy Yard (now mired in court) and a host of other pellution problems.

At a news conference on Wednesday where the results of the study were announced, about 20 community and church leaders from Williamsburg, Greenpoint, Fort Greene and Chnton Hill said they were fed up with noxious neighbors, which include garbage transfer stations and radiosettive storage sites, and wanted the Navy Yard cleaned up.

"When will it end?" asked Tom Veitre, president of the Society for Clinton Hill. "Our neighborhood has

The Rev. Steven Lynch of Saints Peter and Paul Roman Catholic Church in Williamsburg said that two children from his neighborhood had died of leukemia and one from brain cancer, and that he was "very suspicious" about a connection between their illnesses and dumping near the Navy Yard, PCB's are suspected of causing cancer.

Luis Garden Accosta, the leader of El Puente, a community leadership organization, said: "We are standing in the middle of the most toxic area in New York City. We ask the state to respond to the democratic








